Figure 2: Identifying the governance requirements of GPGs






Table 1: Meeting the governance requirements of GPGs – Current impediments and longer-term corrective steps

GPG governance requirement	Current impediment	Longer-term corrective measure
Averting risk of dual actor failure	Moving past the conventional notion of sovereignty	Forging global consensus on a notion of responsible sovereignty
Promoting global fairness	Recognizing policy interdependence	Demonstrating that it 'pays' to cooperate and exercise 'smart power'
Facilitating 'getting to the good'	Recognizing the transnationalness of the goods' provision path	Introducing a global, integrated multi-level policy approach into the current governance systems, nationally and internationally
Fostering a coherent, global public domain	Giving consideration to the global public domain	Introducing a multi-issue focus on the global public domain into the organization of multilateral governance
