ICP 2021 Cycle Participation and Survey Status

- The total number of participating economies is expected to be comparable to the ICP 2017 cycle [176 economies]
- The COVID-19 pandemic has delayed the price collection for household consumption surveys in some of the ICP 2021 participating economies
- To address this issue, the price collection period may be extended to 2022, if necessary, in order to cover a 12-month cycle
- Additional workshops and capacity building activities are being prepared by all ICP Regional Implementing Agencies



Governance Activities: Governing Board

First meeting on April 26, 2021

- Convened as the (new) Board for the ICP 2021 cycle and elected the cochairs
 - Argentina | Finland (Co-Chair) | Kazakhstan | Malaysia | Mexico | Nepal | Qatar | Samoa | Senegal | South Africa (Co-Chair) | Suriname
- Reviewed ICP Governance Framework
- Considered Technical Advisory Group (TAG) nominations
- Discussed the implementation, timetable, and funding of the ICP 2021 cycle
- Next meeting scheduled for March 2022, in conjunction with the 53rd Session of the UNSC

Governance Activities: Technical Advisory Group

- First meeting for the ICP 2021 cycle on May 17-19, 2021
 - Welcomed new TAG members Michel Mouyelo-Katoula and Mary O'Mahony
 - Discussed the ICP 2017 results and their impact
 - Reviewed the progress made on several ICP research agenda items
- Next meeting scheduled for November 9-11, 2021
 - Update on the ICP 2021 cycle and IACG asks to TAG
 - Focus on COVID-19 impact on economic statistics and ICP
 - Analysis of research agenda topics in light of the COVID-19





The ILO **flagship report** published in June 2021 uses PPP-based poverty lines to establish working poverty rates, and PPPs to compare labor incomes and identify different economic classes of workers

The Worldwide Bureaucracy Indicators (WWBI) is a cross-national dataset on public sector employment and wages. The indicators are derived using a consistent methodology from micro-data based on nationally representative labor force and household surveys, and administrative data. WWBI is the most comprehensive dataset of its kind with 192 indicators for 200 countries. It is a product of the Bureaucracy Lab, a collaboration between the Governance Global Practice and the Development Impact Evaluation (DIME) Department in the Development Economics Vice-Presidency.

The World Bank <u>Worldwide</u> <u>Bureaucracy Indicators</u> <u>database</u> was updated in September 2021 includes ICPbased wage compression ratios in the public sector and expenditure data for 167 countries

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
